This year has seen a tremendous amount of effort poured into our endeavor to build a new Education Center in Mitchell Canyon, and we are proud to have raised \$1,000,000 on our own at the close of 2024.

Mission

IN 2024, MDIA CONTINUED its mission of financial and interpretive support of Mount Diablo State Park. Merchandise sales, donations, membership contributions, employee matching funds, and grants enabled us to support a variety of projects within the park. As an all-volunteer staff, our administrative expenses are low, allowing nearly 90% of our income to be allocated to enhancing the visitor experience. Some of the many projects funded by MDIA are outlined in this report. I would like to personally thank you, our members, for continuing to support our efforts of "Preservation through Education."

Board Retreat

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

held its sixth annual board retreat this year, an in-person event held at Save Mount Diablo's Curry Canyon Ranch. We set several goals for ourselves coming into 2025. Primary among these goals is the exciting project of building a brand-new visitor center at Mitchell Canyon with goals of



completing architectural drawings, designing interior spaces, entering the project into the state budget, and beginning construction bidding. We also set goals of developing a new Wildflower Guide book, adding more online nature guides to our website, recruiting more volunteers and board members, and developing more content aimed at school kids.

New Mitchell Canyon Education Center

2024 WAS A HISTORIC YEAR FOR MDIA, as

we secured funding to build a new Education Center at Mitchell Canyon. MDIA was thrilled to be awarded a \$2.6 million grant from the Wildlife Conservation Board (WCB) in August 2024. This grant was the result of 18 months of work with the WCB. Many members of MDIA and Mount Diablo State Park (MDSP) travelled to Sacramento for the Board meeting when this was awarded.

The accompanying milestone for MDIA was that we raised over \$1 million from MDIA Board members, community members, organizations and local foundations in the last two years to support this project. A donor appreciation event was held at Heather Farms in November with about 75 attendees. Steve

Smith, president MDIA, and John Ware, Ware Associates. made presentations about the state of the project. It was well received by the audience. The WCB grant along with the MDIA fundraising effort and the State Budget allocation in 23-24 of \$1 million (championed by Assembly Member Rebecca Bauer-Kahan), secures the \$4.6 million needed to proceed to the construction phase.

The architectural firm of Ware Associates is now preparing the final construction drawings to submit to the State in June 2025 in preparation for bidding the project in late 2025. Meantime, MDIA is working with MDSP to retain an exhibit planning firm in 2025. This firm will help us design the interior and exterior exhibits for the new building as well as leading us through the fabrication and installation phase.

We are so thankful to everyone who shared our vision for the new Education Center, which will now become a reality.



IN 2024, MDIA CELEBRATED

Attendance was low on April 13 due to rain, but September 13 saw a warm and sunny celebration in Mitchell Canyon of MDIA's contributions to Mount Diablo State Park. Finances

MDIA'S 2024 CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE PARK included funding the following projects:

- Publishing and printing 40,000 copies of the *Mount Diablo Review* newsletter given to all park visitors and to local community organizations
- Hosting the Mountain Talks educational speaker series via webinar
- Producing our Wild Mount Diablo video series including segments on Rare Plants, Newts and Soap Root
- Funding for the Diablo Stove Restoration

- Fundraising for a new Education Center
- Producing the new publication Bees of Mount Diablo

Maintenance and Trail Signage

SEVERAL ONGOING MAINTENANCE PROJECTS

included completion of the Diablo Stove renovation project in Rock City, refurbishing map kiosks and replacing maps, and repairing picnic tables. Work continues to keep the waterproofing in good repair up at the top of the Summit Building. A long-anticipated trail sign order was partially filled with 25 new signs replacing many dilapidated and worn signs throughout the park. Most notably was the replacement of the post and marker for Mount Olympia, a difficult job and long overdue.


Membership

IN FEBRUARY 2023, MDIA APPROVED a new membership model with two categories: Regular and Life membership. All Life members continued in this status, and all donors of \$1,000 or more were made Life members. In 2024, MDIA completed its preparation to place all memberships


on the same calendar year. Beginning January 2025, all current members will be invited to renew, and non-members will be given the opportunity to join MDIA. Life members, now 171 in total, will be thanked for their support as well.

Merchandising

MERCHANDISING IN 2024 saw improvement in supply chain issues, but increasing inflation along with shipping costs continue to rise prompting an increase in some of our prices. Overall sales have increased 10% over the previous year and remain our main source of revenue aside from fundraising. Online sales continue to be robust in the interim, and we are able to generate revenue and share our materials with the many people who came to experience Mount Diablo and the regenerative powers of nature. Visitors to mdia.org can choose from a wide variety of educational, interpretive, and informational products along with a selection of apparel and souvenirs. We also added some new items like Survey Benchmark Stickers and Bees of Mount Diablo guide.

Thank you to Dan Fitzgerald, Steve Smith, and Linda

who coordinate the design of new products, purchase ordering, inventory management, packaging, shipping, and delivery. Because all these operations are performed by volunteers, the financial benefit is substantial.

Education

MDIA PROVIDED ONGOING UPDATES to the County Office of Education regarding our efforts towards the Mitchell Canyon Education Center project and educational opportunities for students in Contra Costa County. The County Superintendent and staff were key supporters of our application for the Wildlife Conservation Board grant. In addition, MDIA worked with Park Interpreter Sharon Peterson regarding events on the mountain like the Junior Rangers program and served as volunteers for school field trips.

Difficulties Multiplied for Diablo Peregrines in 2024

THE 2024 PEREGRINE NESTING SEASON proved a disappointment, with no nesting birds in either of our monitoring zones. At the Castle Rock Cliffs (Area One or A1), our team saw two peregrines early in the season, but the male then disappeared. The female soon abandoned the area as well, and no other peregrines showed up to fill the void. Though we can't know why, we suspect that avian bird flu, a rampant infection nowadays, killed one or both the birds. Nor did the more remote Knobcone Pine (Area Two or A2) host nesting peregrines. Bird flu and human disturbance, one or both, are most likely to blame. Though A2 is officially closed to all visitors during the nesting season February 1 through July 31, on-site cameras showed many trespassers. The nesting site is above the narrowest point of the trail through this steep, rocky canyon, making it difficult for bikers to avoid the rocks entirely, causing loud scraping and banging noises, and the voices of all users are amplified by the close quarters. 

Publications

MDIA MADE A MAJOR CHANGE TO THE MOUNT DIABLO

REVIEW, the newsletter available to all park visitors. Previously, this was an eight-page document, published twice a year. Unused copies were recycled. With the increased emphasis on digital access via the MDIA website, Facebook, and Instagram platforms, the Review is now a four-page document relevant throughout the year. The total volume of paper has been reduced by 50%, and waste has been eliminated.

In addition, MDIA published a new book: Native Bees of Mount Diablo. Photographed and written by Board Member Dan Sandri, this is a must have reference for lovers of the natural history of Mount Diablo.



Outreach

MDIA CONTINUED ITS ACTIVE ROLE in the local community through participation in the following events in which MDIA staffed booths, answered questions about the mountain, and sold MDIA merchandise: 4/7 - Sunol Wildflower days, 6/2 - Walnut Creek Art & Wine festival, 6/2 - Clayton Pride parade, 6/29 - Martinez Beaver Festival, 8/3 - Bronco Days, 10/5-6 - Clayton Oktoberfest, MDIA 50th birthday celebration, 10/19 - Diablo Multisport Connection event, and 11/20 - MCEC presentation to donors.

Hikes

MDIA CONDUCTED A TOTAL OF 45 HIKES

this year. These treks included an early Chaparral Spring hike, Pollinator & Wildflower walks, Common Poorwill hikes, and a "Rocks On the Move" geology hike. Additionally, we organized 12 BioBlitz monthly hikes and 17 Tarantula Walks

during August, September, and October. We also introduced a new leader for 2 Botanical Wonder Walks, which proved to be very successful. We anticipate expanding our team of leaders next year and offering a wider range of diverse events in the future.

Webinars

THE YEAR 2024 WAS SIGNIFICANT for our monthly Zoom webinars. Throughout the year, we hosted sessions on diverse topics including Bats, the Hidden Gems of Mount Diablo, the presentation of four new Wild Mount Diablo films, Rare Plants of Mount Diablo, the release of the new Guidebook to Native Bees of Mount Diablo, Western Pond Turtles, the CEMEX quarry at Mitchell Canyon, Controlled Burns on Mount Diablo, Tarantula Hawks, and Coyotes.

These webinars were delivered by subject matter experts and passionate docents. In total, we had 481 attendees across these webinars. All sessions have been posted on our website, allowing them to reach additional viewers throughout the year. We extend our gratitude to all the different presenters who generously shared their knowledge and enthusiasm for the diverse natural history of Mount Diablo.
